

THRIVE is a group of local parents, schools, community groups, and statutory and voluntary organisations working together to help children and young people in this community to do well. THRIVE aims to improve attainment, aspiration,

wellbeing and collaboration in this community.

One of our delivery partners Family Connections are based in the Dunanney Centre, providing parent programmes and support for local families. They recently ran a Start Smart school readiness programme and a Parentivity wellbeing programme and have just started to deliver an Incredible Years parenting programme.

HODDMIMIR WOOD CRAFT



"When life gives you lemons, make lemonade"

When Covid-19 hit, and local entrepreneurs Richard and Natalie Stewart found themselves being made redundant, that is exactly what they did when they turned their hobby and passion for wood-crafting into a business.

Richard explains how they commenced Hoddmimir's Wood Craft: "We both came from stable jobs but when Covid hit, we were made redundant. We fell back on our woodworking hobby and decided to look at turning it into a business. It is a scary step walking away from a full-time job and a stable income. But we turned that negative into a positive."

Supported through Universal Credit during their startup period, they also availed of mentoring support with a business adviser from Antrim Enterprise. "We had so many untold amount of questions. Thankfully people like Jennifer from Antrim Enterprise were there to help and support us. From forming partnerships to HMRC to promoting ourselves to take forward our projects."

There are two sides to the business; retail and live demonstrations of traditional woodworking techniques. The retail is both corporate gift and craft items for sale in craft and speciality markets, fairs as well as directly through their website. Their products are inspired by historical artifacts from the Viking and Celtic history with imagery being handpainted or burned onto the turned wood by Natalie. On self-employment Natalie says: "We wouldn't go back as we enjoy what we do far too much. A better work life balance even though we probably work harder and longer than we've ever worked in a job before. The difference is it's for us, it's for our family. Our children are now even considering selfemployment options."

In the same week we helped facilitated a visit to Abbots Cross Primary School with the same play. It was great to see the children learning in such an enjoyable manner.




The group recognised the financial burden and struggle within our estate. In February we provided various families with vouchers for fuel, electricity and food to be utilised in our local SPAR supermarket.

In March our group was approached by like-minded people within the area about setting up a networking partnership bringing together local community representives, committed to positive change in the Rathcoole area. It's our pleasure to be part of RECAP.

The group was involved in the designing and launch of a flyer informing people about how to use their vote in the then upcoming elections and to emphasise the importance of not only voting in general, but in that election in-particular. Did you know only 27% of residents within the Rathcoole area voted at the election before election? An extremely worrying number. In May the group took part in a leaflet drop of the agreed flyer. We delivered around 5000 leaflets in the Rathcoole area over 2 days.





RATH volunteers helped organise Antrim Newtownabbey Disability FCs mini tournament to raise awareness for mental health. All proceeds raised will go to a mental health charity. In June we held a Jubilee funday to celebrate to Her Majesty the Queen on her 70 years of her reign is an inspiration and example to us all.



We also opened our new Queen Elizabeth II mural celebrating her Platinum Jubilee. Opened by Rosemary Bell McCracken on behalf of the community and attended by the Rathcoole Protestant Boys, Sons of Kai, Pride of the Hill Carnmoney, 16th Newtownabbey BB and various community groups.



The group got the path at Row on Row tarmacked for easier access. Another development in our aim for a permanent memorial to our fallen in the Rathcoole estate.

ROC CARE RATHCOOLE

Loneliness and social isolation affected many of us during the Covid-19 pandemic. Loneliness in later life whether the loss of a spouse, family living further afield or living alone, has a significant impact on older people's health and well-being. AGEUK reports '200,000 older people say they haven't had a conversation with friends or family for a month, whilst 3.9 million older people agree television is their main form of company. The impact of loneliness can be as harmful to our health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day.' But there is a way of tackling such loneliness.

ROC Care Rathcoole is a befriending scheme for those who face each day on their own. ROC Care Rathcoole offers a weekly visit or call from a volunteer befriender, to the most isolated living in the Rathcoole area. As well as visits, clients are encouraged to attend special events and programmes to help build confidence in being outside their home. ROC Care Rathcoole is a project of national charity, Redeeming Our Communities (ROC) who work in partnership with statutory agencies, local churches and groups to meet social needs within local communities. Since 2017, ROC Northern Ireland have supporting over 20 clients through ROC Care Rathcoole and 15 local people have been trained as befriender volunteers. 

Rathcoole Neighbourhood Renewal Partnership were delighted to host a buzzing Health Fair on the 14th of March. A massive thanks goes to Newtownabbey Methodist Mission for allowing us to use their hall and making sure everyone was very well fed and watered. During the day we had stalls from Surestart, Barnardos, Listening Ear, Newtownabbey Women's Group, Team JVC Hub, Jobs and Benefits Office, Cancer Lifeline, Women's Aid, NHSCT, Praxis Care, Women's Tec and the Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council Health Co-Ordinator and Environmental Health team. Hand massages were provided by Team JVC Hub and local business Tranquillity with food intolerance testing provided by Food Intolerance NI. With over 100 through the door, all were provided with information and important services, and, of course, some of the Methodist Mission's famous lentil soup!



On the 14th and 15th of March the Partnership also invited in Fresh Minds Education who provided us with 2 of their Trust funded Connections Link Life Suicide Awareness sessions. Thanks goes to all those who attended and to Newtownabbey Women's Group for providing a venue for the second course. The courses were very informative, with a lot of good discussion.

NACN COOLE STUDIOS

NACN is a community-based youth provider in Newtownabbey that uses the medium of creative and digital industries as a way to engage with young people that have an interest in this approach. The group is currently funded under the National Lottery Community Fund for Empowering Young People. Our remit is to provide support to young people growing up in socially disadvantaged areas and to provide them with activities and opportunities that normally have barriers that prevent them from growing their talents or developing new skills that will help them with their future goals and aspirations.

January 2022 concluded our successful year long level-2 OCN qualification in photography hosted by Belfast Exposed. Throughout the course, our participating members were taught how to operate, frame and edit photograhs in various scenarios. Throughout the course, members visted locations such as Belfast Exposed Studio, Belfast Titanic Quater & Hillborough Castle & Gardens. At the end of the course, their photographs were displaed in Belfast Exposed Studio's Gallery and hosted as an event open to the public.



Newtownabbey has been neglected over the years when it comes to the world of Performing Arts. NACN recognised this gap and researched the cost of young people trying to get involved. Let's just say the prices being paid are way out of many people's budget and therefore exclude NACN's Community Development SO many. Approach has allowed all young people to participate no matter their economic backgrounds. The NACN Performing Arts Academy has an affordable membership that provides access to all NACN projects under one payment. Setup as part of our Social Enterprise section, the aim is to generate an income to cover the costs so all can benefit. With 3 sections; Tots, Juniors & Seniors we are confident that we can grow the Academy to be good healthy competition to any other private school out there with the Wicked Prices. NACN membership is £25 per Month verse £90 from Private Schools. Partnering up with Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council the Academy is taking the lead with 2 amazing shows, "Into the Woods" the Sold-out Show "Matilda". and The Academy is well supported by the Creative Volunteer Group of parents and friends that have formed the props and costume department.



In May, our Senior Youth Management Team went to London to see what the world of West End had to offer up-and-coming young creative performers. After an early start, we landed in London and headed straight to see the Changing of the Guard, Lunch, and then more sights before getting ready to hit the West End. Grease was shown that night and was fantastic as we ourselves were in the midst of rehearsing at the Theatre at the Mill, Newtownabbey. The next morning, we headed out to Madame Tussauds and then lunch. A big surprise for everyone was a visit to the Pineapple Dance Studios where many professional shows are choreographed, and you may have even seen a TV documentary. Tina Turner that night was something else. Absolutely amazing from start to finish. Sunday before heading home we stopped off at Camden Market to see the Quirky and Creative side of London. We are planning to go again sometime very soon.

July 2nd NACN Performing Arts Academy, under the direction of our young talented Artistic Director Lisa McCord, presented our very own West End Licenced performance of "Grease" at Theatre at the Mill. What a show it was. For many of our young performers, this was the first time being on stage. The Academy has really taken off from this and has been getting established as the provider of Performing Arts in the Borough. NACN is based in Rathcoole however, our membership expands to all 7 DEA's of Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough and further afield to areas such as Newcastle, Bangor, Lisburn etc..... The production needed to have a Grease Lightening Car that was made at the Dimond on the second floor above the shops which needed cut into 2 to get it out and up to the mill the night before the show. This is only one reason why NACN needs extra space to develop the Academy, but hopefully, ANBC will see the importance of Supporting locals.



As part of NACNs Empowering Young People Programme under the National Lottery Community Fund, we ran a level 3 OCN Qualification in event management. Part of the project was to run a showcase at the end to demonstrate the learning outcomes put into practice. Carly Richmond took the lead on this event as the young manager and secured the venue at Nortel Social Club for the showcase. On the night we had great support from councillors, council officers, family members, friends, and ambassadors to NACN. The young leaders set up different stands to show what NACN does and have to offer to young people surrounding in the Rathcoole and areas.

Since then Carly has gone on to enrol at the Metropolitan College in Belfast where NACN has established a network for collaborative working.



NACN was involved with a Queens University Masters Student who was studying Conflict Transformation and Social Justice for her Dissertation. Her theme was "What does peace look like? Visualizing the Future in Rathcoole, Northern Ireland.

What Does Peace Look Like?

The Lady of Rathcoole statue was brought to the estate in 1964, after being created by the sculptor Stephen Toogood. It remained on site until 2003, when redevelopment work at The Diamond saw the statue being taken down and put into storage. NACN received funding from the Northern Ireland Housing Executive to refurbish the statue, and in October, she has been returned to the same site she was last spotted in the estate.

The Lady of Rathcoole gazed down upon the estate for over 40 years, with Centre Manager of NACN, Dee Crooks, telling Belfast Live he's delighted to see a piece of local history being returned.

We applied for funding from the Housing Executive and we got her renovated, put up on the wall above the Spar at our Studio at The Diamond in Rathcoole, ready for a big reveal on Sunday night.

It was a lot of pointing in the wrong direction most of the time to find her, but then a new district manager for the Housing Executive here helped us out and said she knew where she was.

They met us in Antrim and she was in an old warehouse there covered with pallets.

She doesn't belong to the Council or the Housing Executive, she belongs to the people of Rathcoole, and that's why we thought as a youth organisation it was very important to bring her back so the next generation can go through being scared and looking at the ugly woman on the wall.

"I remember her when I was young because she did scare me, she was ugly. That's part of my history growing up on this estate, it's the greatest estate Rathcoole, there's a lot of great people in it. It's good we're able to bring a positive story to the area."

At the end of October, the Lady Of Rathcoole was brough back to Rathcoole, not far from where she was originally perched. The unvieling of the Lady of Rathcoole was turned into an all-day event where the day was filled with activities, costume competition, face painting, local businesses supporting and having tribute acts, us Pink throughout & Meatloaf the evening.

Moving onto our Social Enterprise. back in August, Social Enterprise Northern Ireland contacted NACN to manufactor their 2022 awards for a 2nd year in a row. The previous year, 2021, was our first production of trophies where we produced 3D Printed Lithophane lamps where the designed was focused around a Northern Ireland landmark, The Giant's Causeway with the lamp base having a concrete base in the shape of a causeway stone.

2022 trophies were the same concept but focused on a renewable design with most of the resouces involved were eco-friendly, from recycled wood to eco-friendly filament. 22 awards featured a wooden plinth with a tree trunk design Lithophane Globe attached with а which operated. top battery on are

In addition to this year however, we took it up a few levels and designed their table centrepieces for their event. The design of these were inspired after a German Christmas Pyramid, these were mannufactored in our Studio on our laser-cutter where we produced 65 of these.

The design was inspired by popular landmarks throughout Northern Ireland as Social Entperprise NI covers all of Northern Ireland. The arch of the table center was inspired by the Dark Headges, the rotating bottom piece was inspired by the Giants Causeway, one side had Harland & Wolff Crane and the other has the Mourne Mountains. At the top, the propellers were propelled using four candles at the bottom on the piece, using thermodynamics to create the movement.

Both the table centrepieces and trophies were designed and manufactored by our young people in the Fabrication group, alongside the core design and producers, Adam & Jasmin. This is the start of our Social Entperise journey to become less reliant on funding and to become self-sufficient.
